The rest of the walk took us past hop gardens and a farmyard into fields of wheat and past newly sown vegetables. finally reaching the road with just a short walk back to the pub. A lovely walk ending with lunch at the Man of Kent pub East Peckham.

Legal Power of Attorney

The following information has been forwarded by Keith Goldacre the Kentara Secretary and was an article supplied by Isara member John Franklin who after filling in a simple on line application form received £154.96 from the Ministry of Justice :-Investigation has revealed that the Government has incorrectly calculated the costs of establishing LPA's for people and were legally obliged to refund the over charge. The scheme applies to LPA's established between 1/4/13 and 31/3/17 and there is a sliding scale of refunds from £34 to £45 for each LPA depending on the date you set them up.
